The Hassle-Free Voting Experience: A Practical Guide.

Every active registered voter will automatically receive a ballot in the mail nearly a month before Election Day. You choose **when**, **where**, and **how** you vote! Elections are no longer a one-day event and there is no need to wait until Election Day to vote. You can vote in the comfort of your home or visit a vote center near you. **The choice is yours!**

Here are a few strategies to help make the voting process a more convenient experience for all:

VERIFY YOUR VOTER REGISTRATION

Have you moved or changed your name? Whether you are new to San Diego County or just moved down the street you need to re-register to vote. You can do this by completing a new voter registration form.

Verify your residence address and, if different, your mailing address. You can verify your voter information, register or re-register to vote at sdvote.com.

LEARN YOUR VOTING OPTIONS

VOTE BY MAIL

Sign and date your return envelope, seal your ballot inside, and return it through the U.S. Postal Service.

Remember to sign your return envelope! **Your signature is required for your mail ballot to count.**

BALLOT DROP BOX

Sign and date your return envelope, seal your ballot inside, and return it to any of the Registrar of Voter's official ballot drop boxes.

VOTE CENTER

You can vote in person at any vote center in San Diego County.

Starting **Saturday, October 26**, select vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. until **Saturday, November 2**, when all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

All will again be open on the **final day of voting, November 5**, when the hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Come prepared. Due to the large number of contests on the ballot, it may take you longer to mark your ballot. Mark your selections on the sample ballot found in this pamphlet in advance so that when you go inside the voting booth you can quickly mark your selections.

Vote centers offer a full-service voting experience:

- Vote in-person or drop off an already voted mail ballot (sealed inside its return envelope).
- Use a touchscreen ballot marking device to mark your selections and print out your official ballot.
 - All ballot marking devices are fully accessible allowing voters with disabilities to vote independently and privately.
- Carry in the official ballot you receive in the mail, check-in at the vote center, sign the electronic roster, and cast your official ballot free of its return envelope.
- If you made a mistake or lost your mail ballot, you can instead vote in person using a ballot marking device at any vote center.
- Receive voting assistance, including assistance in multiple languages.
- Register to vote or update your registration and vote on the same day.

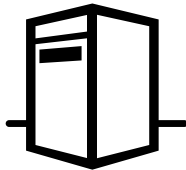

Every active registered voter will automatically receive a ballot in the mail for the upcoming election. Official ballots begin going out in the mail the week of October 6. You should expect to receive yours that same week.



MAIL IT.

DROP IT.

Starting October 8, you may choose to return your mail ballot to any of the Registrar's official ballot drop boxes.

- Starting Saturday, November 2, all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., until the final day of voting, Tuesday, November 5, when the hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Dates to Remember!

Starting **Saturday, October 26**, select vote centers and the Registrar of Voters' office will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., until **Saturday, November 2**, when all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

All will again be open on the final day of voting, **Tuesday, November 5**, when the hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Early voting begins at the Registrar of Voters' office starting **Monday, October 7**, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

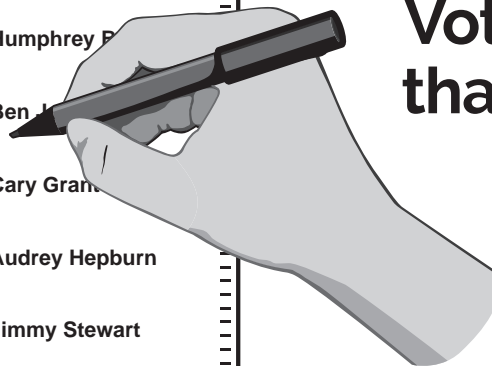

Learn More About San Diego County's Voting System

All voter centers will have a full deployment of accessible touchscreen ballot marking devices. These devices can bring up every ballot type in one of five languages and produce a readable paper ballot. Because of this device, voters can vote in person at any vote center in the county.



This device does not store, tabulate, or count any votes, and does not store voter information.



After the voter confirms their selections on the device, the voter will print their ballot in the voting booth with the attached printer. The system prints a readable paper ballot showing the voter's selections along with a secure barcode. The barcode does not store voter information, it is used to tabulate results at the Registrar of Voter's office.

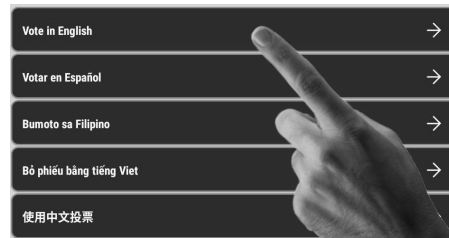
Voters can review their ballot, place it in a secrecy sleeve, and give it to the poll worker to place it in the ballot box to be counted at the Registrar's office. Once placed inside the ballot box, your ballot is officially cast!

Ballot Marking Device (BMD) Voting Instructions



1. Start Voting Session

Poll worker inserts activation card to start voting session. Poll worker will remove the card and allow you to make selections in private.



2. Language Selection

TAP the LANGUAGE of your choice to continue.

3. Adjust Settings

You can ADJUST text size, contrast, audio, and language any time during the ballot marking session.

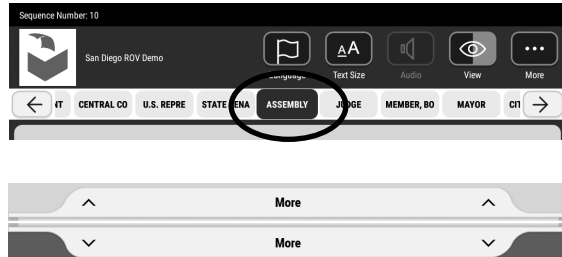


4. Navigate Ballot

Use contest tabs at TOP of screen or the navigation buttons at BOTTOM of screen.



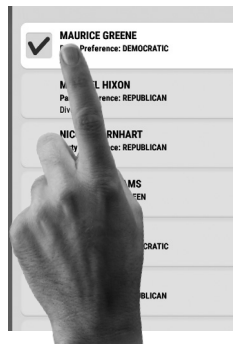
Tap the **MORE** arrows at the top and bottom of the screen to scroll up and down the screen to see all available candidates for contests with multiple candidates.



5. Make Your Selections

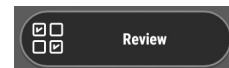
Tap box next to your selection(s) for each contest to vote for that choice. You can tap again to deselect.

Note: For contests with multiple candidates, tap the **MORE** arrows at the top and bottom of the screen to scroll up and down the screen to see all available candidates.

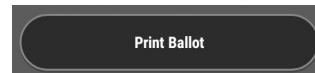


6. Review Your Selections

After voting, tap the REVIEW button at the bottom of the screen.



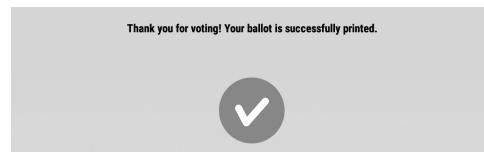
During review, you may make changes to any contest by tapping on the contest. When complete, tap PRINT BALLOT.



7. Print Your Ballot

Tap PRINT YOUR BALLOT or tap REVIEW YOUR CHOICES to return to previous screen.

When complete, tap PRINT.



8. Retrieve Your Paper Ballot from Printer

Confirm your selections, place your ballot in secrecy sleeve or envelope provided by the poll worker. Return to poll worker to place in ballot box. **Get your "I Voted" sticker.**

WARNING: CORRUPTING THE VOTING PROCESS IS PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS SUBJECT TO FINE AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT commit or attempt to commit election fraud.
- DO NOT provide any sort of compensation or bribery to, in any fashion or by any means induce or attempt to induce, a person to vote or refrain from voting.
- DO NOT illegally vote.
- DO NOT attempt to vote or aid another to vote when not entitled to vote.
- DO NOT engage in electioneering; photograph or record a voter entering or exiting a polling place; or obstruct ingress, egress, or parking.
- DO NOT challenge a person's right to vote or prevent voters from voting; delay the process of voting; or fraudulently advise any person that he or she is not eligible to vote or is not registered to vote.
- DO NOT attempt to ascertain how a voter voted their ballot.
- DO NOT possess or arrange for someone to possess a firearm in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT appear or arrange for someone to appear in the uniform of a peace officer, guard, or security personnel in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with any component of a voting system.
- DO NOT forge, counterfeit, or tamper with the returns of an election.
- DO NOT alter the returns of an election.
- DO NOT tamper with, destroy, or alter any polling list, official ballot, or ballot container.
- DO NOT display any unofficial ballot collection container that may deceive a voter into believing it is an official collection box.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with copy of the results of votes cast.
- DO NOT coerce or deceive a person who cannot read or an elder into voting for or against a candidate or measure contrary to their intent.
- DO NOT act as an election officer when you are not one.

EMPLOYERS cannot require or ask their employee to bring their vote by mail ballot to work or ask their employee to vote their ballot at work. At the time of payment of salary or wages, employers cannot enclose materials that attempt to influence the political opinions or actions of their employee.

PRECINCT BOARD MEMBERS cannot attempt to determine how a voter voted their ballot or, if that information is discovered, disclose how a voter voted their ballot.

The prohibitions on activity related to corruption of the voting process summarized above are set forth in Chapter 6 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.

WARNING: ELECTIONEERING PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS CAN LEAD TO FINES AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHERE: Within the immediate vicinity of a person in line to cast their ballot or within 100 feet of the entrance of a polling place, curbside voting or drop box the following activities are prohibited.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT ask a person to vote for or against any candidate or ballot measure.
- DO NOT display a candidate's name, image, or logo.
- DO NOT block access to or loiter near any ballot drop boxes.
- DO NOT provide any material or audible information for or against any candidate or ballot measure near any polling place, vote center, or ballot drop box.
- DO NOT circulate any petitions, including for initiatives, referenda, recall, or candidate nominations.
- DO NOT distribute, display, or wear any clothing (hats, shirts, signs, buttons, stickers) that include a candidate's name, image, logo, and/or support or oppose any candidate or ballot measure.
- DO NOT display information or speak to a voter about the voter's eligibility to vote.

The electioneering prohibitions summarized above are set forth in Article 7 of Chapter 4 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.

Accessible Voting

The Registrar of Voters is committed to providing voters with disabilities a secure, independent and private voting experience. Every effort has been made to ensure all vote centers meet usable accessibility standards. Vote centers will feature:

- Accessible ballot marking devices
- Curbside voting
- Additional assistance upon request

Voters that are unable to mark a ballot may bring up to two individuals to assist in voting (§ 14282 (b)).

Disability Rights California will operate a statewide Election Day Hotline for voters having difficulty voting because of a disability, please call (800) 735-2929.



Ballot Marking Device

Ballot marking devices will be available at every vote center. Each ballot marking device is equipped with a headset and a handheld controller for audio-based voting and is also available in Chinese, Filipino, Spanish and Vietnamese.

Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail (RAVBM) System

The RAVBM system allows a voter with a disability to download a ballot on a personal computer and mark it privately and independently using their own assistive technology. After marking the ballot, the voter will print and return their ballot using the printable envelope template included in the RAVBM instructions. Just like any mail ballot, RAVBM ballots must be sealed inside an envelope, signed, and returned by mail, at any vote center, or official ballot drop box.

To request a RAVBM ballot you can complete the postcard with pre-paid postage located on the back of this pamphlet.

Voters who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech-disabled may use the California Relay Service (CRS) by dialing 711 to use the telephone system via a text telephone (TTY) or other devices to call the Registrar's Toll-Free Voter Phone Line. CRS supports the following modes of communication: TTY, VCO, 2LVCO, HCO, STS, VASTS, ASCII, or Voice.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

Under the California Voter's Choice Act, each eligible voter in San Diego County will receive a ballot in the mail nearly a month before Election Day. Voters may return their ballot by mail, at an official ballot drop box, or at any vote center. They may also choose to vote in-person at any vote center in the county.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, voters may request a vote by mail ballot in Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, or Chinese. For select precincts, voters may request a facsimile copy of the ballot in Arabic, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Persian, or Somali.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, voters may request a remote accessible vote by mail ballot. This allows a voter with a disability to download a ballot onto a personal computer and mark it privately and independently using their own assistive technology.

To request a vote by mail ballot, facsimile ballot, or remote accessible vote by mail ballot, contact the Registrar of Voters at (858) 565-5800, toll free at (800) 696-0136, or at rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

Conforme la Ley de Opciones para el Votante de California, cada votante elegible en el Condado de San Diego recibirá por correo una boleta electoral alrededor de un mes antes del Día de la Elección. Los votantes pueden depositar su boleta electoral por correo en un buzón oficial para boletas electorales o entregarla en cualquier centro de votación. También pueden optar por votar en persona en cualquier centro de votación del condado.

Al menos siete días antes del día de la elección, los votantes pueden solicitar una boleta de voto-por-correo en español, filipino, vietnamita o chino. En algunos distritos electorales, los votantes pueden solicitar una copia facsímil de la boleta electoral en árabe, japonés, coreano, laosiano, persa o somalí.

Al menos siete días antes del día de la elección, los votantes pueden solicitar una boleta electoral de voto-por-correo de acceso remoto. Esto le permite a un votante con discapacidad descargar una boleta electoral en una computadora personal y marcarla de forma privada e independiente utilizando su propia tecnología de asistencia.

Para solicitar una boleta electoral de voto-por-correo, una copia facsímil de la boleta electoral o una boleta electoral de voto-por-correo de acceso remoto, comuníquese con el Registro Electoral llamando al (858) 565-5800, al número gratuito (800) 696-0136 o en rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

Sa ilalim ng Voter's Choice Act ng California, ang bawat karapat-dapat na botante sa County ng San Diego ay tatanggap ng balota sa koreo ng halos isang buwan bago ang Araw ng Eleksyon. Maaaring ibalik ng mga botante ang kanilang balota sa pamamagitan ng koreo, sa isang opisyal na ballot drop box, o sa anumang vote center. Maaari rin nilang piliing bumoto nang personal sa anumang vote center sa county.

Sa hindi lalampas ng pitong araw bago ang araw ng eleksyon, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng balota ng pagboto sa pamamagitan ng koreo sa wikang Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, o Chinese. Para sa mga piling presinto, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng facsimile na kopya ng balota sa Arabic, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Persian, o Somali.

Sa hindi lalampas ng pitong araw bago ang araw ng eleksyon, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng remote na accessible na balota ng pagboto sa pamamagitan ng koreo. Nagpapahintulot ito sa botanteng may kapansanan na i-download ang balota sa isang personal na computer at markahan ito nang pribado at nakapag-iisa gamit ang sarili niyang pantulong na teknolohiya.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

Theo Đạo Luật Quyền Lựa Chọn Của Cử Tri (Voter's Choice Act) California, mỗi cử tri hợp lệ tại Quận San Diego sẽ nhận được một lá phiếu bầu qua đường bưu điện gần một tháng trước Ngày Bầu Cử. Các cử tri có thể gửi lại lá phiếu bầu qua thư, tại thùng thu nhận phiếu bầu chính thức hoặc tại bất kỳ trung tâm bỏ phiếu nào. Họ cũng có thể chọn bỏ phiếu trực tiếp tại bất kỳ trung tâm bỏ phiếu nào trong quận.

Không trễ hơn bảy ngày trước ngày bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu lá phiếu bầu bằng thư bằng tiếng Tây Ban Nha, Phi Luật Tân, Việt Nam, hay Trung Hoa. Đối với một số khu bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu bản sao lá phiếu bằng tiếng Ả Rập, Nhật Bản, Đại Hàn, Lào, Ba Tư hoặc Somali.

Không trễ hơn bảy ngày trước ngày bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu được bầu bằng thư truy cập từ xa. Điều này cho phép cử tri bị khuyết tật tải lá phiếu xuống máy tính cá nhân và đánh dấu một cách riêng tư và độc lập bằng cách sử dụng công nghệ hỗ trợ của mình.

Để yêu cầu lá phiếu bầu qua thư, lá phiếu bầu qua fax hoặc lá phiếu bầu bằng thư truy cập từ xa, liên lạc Văn Phòng Bầu Cử theo số (858) 565-5800, số điện thoại miễn phí (800) 696-0136, hoặc tại rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

《加州選民選擇法案》規定，San Diego縣每名符合資格的選民將於選舉日前一個月左右收到郵寄的選票。選民可以通過郵寄、官方選票投遞箱或者任何投票中心交回其選票。他們也可以選擇到縣內任何投票中心進行親身投票。

選民可以要求西班牙文、菲律賓文、越南文或中文版郵寄選票，但不得晚於選舉日前7天。在特別選定的選區，選民可以要求索取阿拉伯文、日文、韓文、寮文、波斯文或索馬里文選票的傳真副本。

選民可以要求遠端無障礙郵寄選票，但不得晚於選舉日前7天。這允許身障選民將選票下載至個人電腦，並使用自己的輔助科技工具，有隱私並獨立地標記選票。

بموجب قانون اختيار الناخبين في كاليفورنيا، سيحصل كل ناخب مؤهل في مقاطعة سان دييغو على بطاقة اقتراع عبر البريد قبل شهر تقريباً من يوم الانتخابات. يجوز للناخبين إعادة اقتراعهم عن طريق إرسال الاقتراع بالبريد، أو في موقع صندوق إيداع الاقتراع الرسمي، أو في أي مركز تصويت. ويجوز لهم أيضاً اختيار التصويت حضورياً في أي مركز تصويت في المقاطعة.

في موعد لا يتجاوز سبعة أيام قبل يوم الانتخابات، يجوز للناخبين طلب التصويت عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد باللغة الإسبانية أو الفلبينية أو الفيتنامية أو الصينية. بالنسبة لدوائر انتخابية محددة، يجوز أن يطلب الناخبون نسخة طبق الأصل من بطاقة الاقتراع باللغة العربية أو اليابانية أو الكورية أو اللاوسية أو الفارسية أو الصومالية.

في موعد لا يتجاوز سبعة أيام قبل يوم الانتخابات، يجوز أن يطلب الناخبون التصويت عن بعد عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد. يتيح ذلك للناخب من ذوي الإعاقة تنزيل بطاقة اقتراع على جهاز كمبيوتر شخصي ووضع علامة عليها بشكل خاص ومستقل باستخدام التكنولوجيا المساعدة الخاصة به.

لطلب التصويت عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد، أو الاقتراع بالفاكس، أو التصويت الذي يمكن الوصول إليه عن بعد عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد، اتصل بمسجل الناخبين على (858) 565-5800، الرقم المجاني على (800) 696-0136، أو على rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

California州投票権法 (California Voter's Choice Act) により、San Diego郡の有権者には、選挙日のほぼ1ヶ月前に投票用紙が郵送されます。有権者は、投票用紙を、郵送にて、あるいは公式な投票ボックス、もしくは投票センターのいずれかで票を投じることができます。また、郡内の投票センターで直接投票することもできます。

選挙当日の7日前までに、有権者はスペイン語、フィリピン語、ベトナム語、中国語による郵便投票を要求することができます。一部の選挙区では、有権者はアラビア語、日本語、韓国語、ラオス語、ペルシア語、ソマリア語のファクシミリ投票用紙のコピーを要求することができます。

選挙当日の7日前までに、有権者は、リモートアクセス可能な郵便投票を要求することができます。これにより、障害のある有権者は、パソコンに投票用紙をダウンロードし、自分自身の支援技術を用いて、個人的に独自に投票用紙に印をつけることができます。

니아 유권자 선택법(California Voter's Choice Act)에 따라 San Diego 카운티 내 모든 유자격 유권자는 선거일로부터 거의 1개월 이전에 우편으로 투표지를 받게 됩니다. 유권자는 이 투표지를 우편이나 공식 투표지 투입함, 또는 가까운 투표 센터에서 반환할 수 있습니다. 또한, 카운티 내 투표 센터를 직접 방문하여 투표하기를 선택할 수도 있습니다.

유권자는 선거일로부터 7일 이전까지 스페인어, 필리핀어, 베트남어 또는 중국어 우편 투표지를 요청할 수 있습니다. 일부 선캄리포거구의 경우, 유권자는 투표지 팩시밀리 사본을 아랍어, 일본어, 한국어, 라오어, 페르시아어 또는 소말리어로 요청할 수 있습니다.

유권자는 선거일로부터 7일 이전까지 원격 접근 가능한 우편 투표지를 요청할 수 있습니다. 이는 장애가 있는 유권자가 투표지를 개인용 컴퓨터에 다운로드하여 본인의 장애인 보조 기기를 이용하여 개인적 및 독립적으로 기표할 수 있도록 해주는 서비스입니다.

طبق قانون انتخاب رای دهنده کالیفرنیا (California Voter's Choice Act)، هر رای دهنده واجد شرایط در کانتی سن دیهگو، یک برگه رای پستی تقریباً یک ماه قبل از روز انتخابات دریافت خواهد کرد. رای دهندگان برگه رای های خود را از طریق پست، از طریق صندوق تحویل رای رسمی، یا در یک مرکز رای گیری برمی گردانند. همچنین آنها می توانند حضوری در یک مرکز رای گیری در کانتی رای دهند.

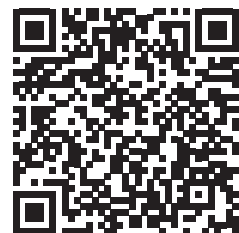

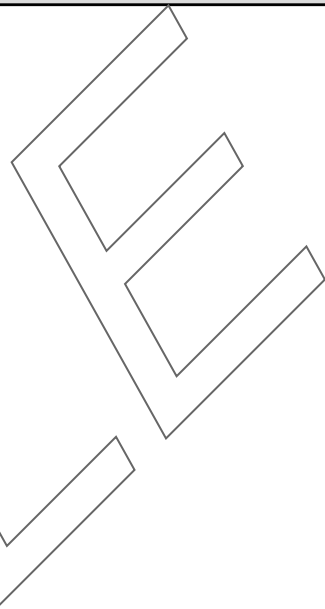

This measure requires Simple Majority (50%+1) of those voting on the measure.

COUNTY COUNSEL IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

MEASURE TO FUND SAN DIEGO COUNTY TRANSPORTATION, INFRASTRUCTURE, AND SAFETY PROJECTS THROUGH A HALF-CENT SALES TAX

This measure was placed on the ballot by a petition signed by the requisite number of voters.

This measure, if approved by a majority vote of qualified electors, would impose a transactions and use tax (commonly referred to as a "sales tax") of a half cent per dollar on the sale of all tangible personal property in the County of San Diego, in both incorporated and unincorporated areas. The sales tax would be administered similarly to collection of other state and local sales taxes. The sales tax is subject to certain specified exemptions and exclusions that are generally consistent with state and locally imposed sales taxes. The sales tax would remain in effect until repealed by voters. Proponents estimate that the sales tax would generate approximately \$350,000,000 per year.

Proceeds of the sales tax would be administered by the San Diego County Regional Transportation Commission ("Commission"). The Board of Directors of the San Diego Association of Governments serves as the Commission.

The Commission would spend the money as follows:

- 50% on capital projects related to transit;
- 27% on capital projects related to road and highway traffic flow and commuter safety;
- 7% for streets, road maintenance, and active transportation, half of which is designated for road projects of cities within San Diego County, based on population;
- 12% on transit operations and maintenance for the Metropolitan Transit System and North County Transit District;
- 2% for the repair, rehabilitation, and replacement necessary for rail transit; and,
- No more than 2% on general administration.

The measure would create a Taxpayer Oversight Committee to evaluate whether moneys have been spent according to the measure's requirements. The Committee is allotted a budget of up to \$300,000 per year with that amount increasing annually for inflation based on the Consumer Price Index. The measure would require the Commission to annually certify that it has properly expended the sales tax funds.

A YES vote would impose a half-cent sales tax for use on transportation, infrastructure, and safety projects.

A NO vote would reject a half-cent sales tax for use on transportation, infrastructure, and safety projects.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G

The people of the County of San Diego ordain as follows:

Section 1. Title

This measure shall be known and may be cited as the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Ordinance.

Section 2. Findings

The people of the County of San Diego hereby find and declare the following:

(a) San Diego County is a great place to live and raise a family, but traffic congestion, crumbling streets and freeway gridlock threaten our quality of life.

(b) Time stuck in traffic takes away from time better spent at home with family and friends.

(c) Pothole riddled streets lead to increased costs for car maintenance and fuel.

(d) Aging infrastructure, from coastal rail lines to storm drains, are at serious risk of collapse.

(e) And jam-packed freeways aren't only frustrating – they pollute our air and damage the climate.

(f) To keep San Diego safe, livable and thriving, we need to invest in projects to reduce traffic, fix crumbling infrastructure, and improve transportation countywide.

(g) This measure is focused on the essential transportation improvements that will make life better for San Diego County residents now: getting more cars off the road by expanding the transit system and making our existing roads and highways safer and more efficient.

(h) The time is now – without this measure, we will experience even more traffic, gridlock, and smog as San Diego's population continues to grow and the number of cars increases.

(i) This measure's funding is guaranteed to go directly to San Diego County transportation priorities – and nothing else. The funds go directly into a special account politicians can't touch and, if the funds are misused, violators will be subject to possible criminal prosecution by the District Attorney and Attorney General.

(j) Independent audits every year and a citizens' taxpayer oversight committee will ensure funds are spent wisely on transportation priorities as the voters intend.

Section 3. Purpose and Intent

It is the people of San Diego County's intent to do all of the following with the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Ordinance:

(a) Reduce traffic congestion and gridlock, improve freeway traffic flow and make commutes shorter and easier.

(b) Expand San Diego's public transit system with rapid routes to job centers and schools, a rail connection to the Airport, and improved service on trolleys and buses.

(c) Help address San Diego County's severe housing shortage by providing additional resources for our transportation and transit systems.

(d) Keep the transportation system safe with repairs, retrofits and safety upgrades to aging bridges, storm drains and rail lines on bluffs in danger of collapse.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

(e) Reduce air pollution and preserve natural habitat and open space to protect San Diego's environment and quality of life.

(f) Make public transportation more affordable, convenient and reliable for seniors, students, the disabled and working-class people without cars who rely on transit.

(g) Create thousands of quality, blue-collar construction jobs and better connect our region's employment centers to attract jobs of all kinds to San Diego County.

(h) Create and maintain fire evacuation routes in wildfire-prone areas so San Diego County is prepared and safe in case of emergency.

(i) Provide funding for local road repairs in every city and in unincorporated San Diego County, including filling potholes, repaving streets and upgrades for pedestrian safety.

(j) The measure will not impose a tax or fee on drivers, developers, or others based on vehicle miles traveled (VMT) and does not impose vehicle miles traveled standards on commercial or residential development projects in San Diego County. The measure imposes a transaction and use tax, subject to a majority vote of County voters, at the rate of one-half of one percent (.5%) within San Diego County to fund transportation priorities within the County, including funding transportation infrastructure projects by the San Diego County Regional Transportation Commission.

(k) Protect taxpayers with strict accountability measures, including independent audits and citizens' oversight, to ensure funds are spent as intended by voters.

Section 4. County of San Diego Improvement Plan

Chapter 5 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the County of San Diego Code of Regulatory Ordinances is added to read as follows:

22.501 Title

This chapter shall be known as the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Ordinance (the "Ordinance").

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

22.502 Definitions

For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

"Commission" means the San Diego County Regional Transportation Commission created by Chapter 1576 of the Statutes of 1985 (Division 12.7 (commencing with Section 132000) of the Public Utilities Code).

"Committee" means the Taxpayer Oversight Committee established as set forth in Section 22.520.

"County" means the County of San Diego.

"Fund" means the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund.

"Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than one hundred ten (110) days after the adoption of this Ordinance.

22.503 Purpose

This Ordinance is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

(a) To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) and Section 7285.5 of Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, which authorize the County to adopt this tax Ordinance, which shall be operative if a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve the imposition of the tax at an election called for that purpose. This retail transactions and use tax shall be in addition to any other taxes authorized by law, including any existing or future state or local transactions and use tax. The imposition, administration, and collection of the tax shall be in accordance with all applicable statutes, laws, and rules and regulations prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

(b) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(c) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax therefor that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.

(d) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this Ordinance.

22.504 Contract with State

(a) Prior to the operative date, the County shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax Ordinance; provided, that if the County shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

(b) Pursuant to section 22.517, the County may use the proceeds from this transactions and use tax Ordinance to pay for the costs to

administer and operate the transactions and use taxes Ordinance pursuant to section 7272 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

22.505 Transactions Tax Rate

For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated and unincorporated territory of the County at the rate of one half of one percent (0.5%) of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date of this Ordinance.

22.506 Place of Sale

For purposes of this Ordinance, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or the retailer's agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

22.507 Use Tax Rate

An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the County of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date of this Ordinance for storage, use or other consumption in said territory at the rate of one half of one percent (0.5%) of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

22.508 Adoption of Provisions of State Law

Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this Ordinance as though fully set forth herein.

22.509 Limitations on Adoption of State Law and Collection of Use Taxes

(a) In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

(1) Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this County shall be substituted therefore. However, the substitution shall not be made when:

(A) The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California.

(B) The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this County or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this Ordinance.

(C) In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:

(i) Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption

remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;

(ii) Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the said provision of that code.

(D) In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(b) The word "County" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(c) "A retailer engaged in business in the County" shall also include any retailer that, in the preceding calendar year or the current calendar year, has total combined sales of tangible personal property in this state or for delivery in the State by the retailer and all persons related to the retailer that exceeds five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). For purposes of this section, a person is related to another person if both persons are related to each other pursuant to Section 267(b) of Title 26 of the United States Code and the regulations thereunder.

22.510 Permit Not Required

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this Ordinance.

22.511 Exemptions and Exclusions

(a) There shall be excluded from the Ordinance of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

(b) There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:

(1) Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the County in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.

(2) Sales of property to be used outside the County, which is shipped to a point outside the County, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or the retailer's agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this section, delivery to a point outside the County shall be satisfied:

(A) With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-county address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and

(B) With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business outside the County and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

(3) The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this Ordinance.

(4) A lease of tangible personal property, which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this Ordinance.

(5) For the purposes of paragraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

(c) There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this Ordinance, the storage, use or other consumption in this County of tangible personal property:

(1) The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.

(2) Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

(3) If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this Ordinance.

(4) If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date of this Ordinance.

(5) For the purposes of subsections (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

(6) Except as provided in subsection (7) a retailer engaged in business in the County shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the County or participates within the County in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the County or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the County under the authority of the retailer.

(7) "A retailer engaged in business in the County" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the County.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

(d) Any person subject to use tax under this Ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a county imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.

22.512 Amendments

All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this Ordinance to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are consistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this Ordinance, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this Ordinance.

22.513 Enjoining Collection Forbidden

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the State or the County, or against any officer of the State or the County, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this Ordinance, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

22.514 [Reserved]

22.515 San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure and Safety Fund

There is hereby established in the treasury of the County of San Diego a special fund called San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund, which shall be maintained by the County.

22.516 Receipt of Proceeds

(a) All revenue generated by this Ordinance shall be deposited into the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund.

(b) The uses and expenditures of money allocated to the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure and Safety Fund shall be governed by and subject to the requirements set forth in sections 22.517 through 22.519.

22.517 Use of Proceeds

(a) Moneys in the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund shall be used to reimburse the County for the costs imposed by the California Tax and Fee Administration to administer and operate this tax pursuant to subdivision (b) of section 22.504 and for use by the Taxpayer Oversight Committee pursuant to subdivision (e) of section 22.520.

(b) The remaining moneys in the Fund shall be appropriated each fiscal year to the San Diego County Regional Transportation Commission solely for the purposes specified in section 22.519.

22.518 Supplement to Existing Commission Funding

(a) The People of the County of San Diego find and declare that transportation infrastructure needs of the County require more resources than currently provided. In adopting this measure, the people of the County of San Diego choose to provide additional County resources to supplement, and not supplant, local, State, Federal and other funding for the Commission.

(b) This funding is intended to be in addition to and not to replace any other monies provided by the County to the Commission.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

22.519 Expenditure Plan

(a) The proceeds in the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund shall be expended in the following manner:

(1) Fifty percent (50%) on capital projects related to transit including, but not limited, to:

(A) Upgrades and improvements to the I-5 North Coast Corridor rail line to prevent bluff collapse, and to increase rail route safety and reliability;

(B) Rail connector to San Diego International Airport;

(C) Rail system extension from South County to Kearny Mesa;

(D) Infrastructure upgrades for express service on South County rail lines;

(E) Creating a system of rapid routes/transit connections between population and job centers, including Mission Valley, Sorrento Valley, La Mesa, Escondido, South County and the Border;

(F) Road and highway grade separations, pedestrian safety, stormwater infrastructure, active transportation, habitat preservation, and climate mitigation projects.

(G) Safety, mobility, amenities, and security enhancements at transit stops.

(2) Twenty-seven (27%) on capital projects related to road and highway traffic flow and commuter safety, including, but not limited to:

(A) Fire evacuation routes on State Route 67 and other roadways in fire prone areas;

(B) Bridge safety repair and retrofits;

(C) Highway maintenance, improvements, and connectivity projects on State Routes 56, 76, 78, 94, 125 and Interstates 5, 8, 15, 805;

(D) HOV lanes and traffic congestion reduction programs throughout the County;

(E) Expanding electric vehicle infrastructure, including electric vehicle charging stations, and acquisition of electric zero emission buses;

(F) Road and highway grade separations, pedestrian safety, stormwater infrastructure, active transportation, habitat preservation, and climate mitigation projects.

(3) Seven percent (7%) for local streets, roads maintenance, and active transportation, half of which will be Local Return Funds for local road projects, including repaving streets, filling potholes, fixing storm drains, and active transportation projects. "Local Return Funds" means funds returned to the cities within San Diego County, based on population, for the purposes specified in this paragraph.

(4) Twelve percent (12%) on transit operations and maintenance for the Metropolitan Transit System and North County Transit District, including, but not limited to:

(A) Keeping fares affordable and/or free for seniors, youth, disabled, veterans;

(B) Frequency and service enhancements on bus routes and rail transit services;

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

(C) Enhancing transit stop safety and sanitation services.

(5) Two percent (2%) for the repair, rehabilitation and replacement required to maintain reliable, safe, effective, and efficient rail transit services.

(6) No more than two percent (2%) shall be expended on general administrative services including contractual services, salaries, wages, benefits, and overhead necessary to carry out administrative responsibilities.

(b) The purposes set forth in this section shall constitute the specific purposes of the Ordinance, which are specific and legally binding limitations on how the proceeds of the tax can be spent. The proceeds of the tax imposed by this Ordinance shall be used only for such purposes and shall not fund any purpose, program or project other than those set forth herein.

(c) The County shall require the Commission to certify on an annual basis that all expenditures made in the prior fiscal year have been expended consistent with the requirements set forth in this Ordinance. The Commission shall make this certification in a report presented to the San Diego County Board of Supervisors, which shall be made available to the public.

22.520 Taxpayer Oversight Committee

(a) The Taxpayer Oversight Committee shall be established on the effective date of this ordinance, as specified in Elections Code section 9122, to provide an enhanced level of accountability for the expenditures from the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund. The Board of Supervisors shall appoint members to the Taxpayer Oversight Committee no later than 45 days after the effective date of this Ordinance.

(b) The Taxpayer Oversight Committee shall be composed of seven at-large, voting members with the characteristics described below. Members of the committee shall not simultaneously hold any elected office. The intent is to have one member representing each of the specified areas of expertise. If, however, after a good faith effort, qualified individuals have not been identified for one or more of the areas of expertise, then no more than two members from one or more of the remaining areas of expertise may be selected. For each of the areas of expertise listed below, an individual representing one of the region's colleges or universities who possesses a comparable level of academic experience is eligible for selection.

(1) A professional in the field of municipal/public finance and/or budgeting with a minimum of ten years in a relevant and senior decision-making position in the public or private sector.

(2) A licensed architect, civil engineer, or traffic engineer with demonstrated experience of ten years or more in the fields of transportation and/or urban design in government or the private sector.

(3) A professional with demonstrated experience of ten years or more in real estate, land economics, and/or right-of-way acquisition.

(4) A professional with demonstrated experience of ten years or more in the management of large-scale construction projects.

(5) A licensed engineer with appropriate credentials in the field of transportation project design or construction and a minimum of ten years of experience in a relevant and senior decision-making position in the government or private sector.

(6) The chief executive officer or person in a similar senior-level decision-making position, of a major private sector employer who possesses demonstrated experience in leading a large organization.

(7) A professional in biology or environmental science with demonstrated experience of ten years or more with environmental regulations and major project mitigation requirements and/or habitat acquisition and management.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

(8) A representative of a labor union whose membership is comprised primarily of workers in the building and construction trades industry in San Diego County.

(9) A representative of the environmental justice community who is a frequent user of the San Diego County transit system.

(10) The Committee shall have two ex-officio members: the Executive Director of the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) and the San Diego County Auditor.

(c) The Committee shall have the following responsibilities:

(1) Conduct an annual fiscal and compliance audit of all San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund expenditures using the services of an independent fiscal auditor to verify compliance with the Ordinance. This annual audit will evaluate compliance with the supplemental funding requirement in section 22.518 and any other applicable requirements. The audits will identify each project that was funded in the prior fiscal year and will include the accumulated expenses and revenues for ongoing, multi-year projects.

(2) Prepare an annual report presenting the results of the annual audit process. The report should include an assessment of the consistency of the expenditures of the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund with the Ordinance. The assessment shall include a review of expenditures by project type for each local jurisdiction. The report shall be presented to the San Diego County Board of Supervisors and the Board of Directors of the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), and shall be made available to the public.

(3) If the Committee determines that any funds in the San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety Fund were misused in violation of section 424 of the Penal Code or any other state law, the Committee shall make a referral detailing the misuse to the San Diego County District Attorney's Office, the Attorney General, and any other applicable state or local agency or official.

(d) Term limits

(1) Committee members shall serve a term of four years, except that for the initial appointments to this Committee, three members shall serve a two-year term and four members shall serve a three-year term in order to ensure the terms of the Committee members are sufficiently staggered.

(2) Committee members shall serve no more than eight years unless the member's first term was less than four years, in which case the member may serve an additional two terms after the partial term. In no case, however, shall any member serve more than ten years on the Committee.

(3) If and when vacancies in the membership of the Committee occur, the same selection process as outlined above shall be followed to select a replacement to fill the remainder of the term. At the completion of a term, eligible incumbent members will need to apply for reappointment for another term.

(4) Term limits for Committee members should be staggered to prevent turnover of more than two members at any one time. In the event more than two members need to be replaced during the same recruitment period, the Selection Committee shall determine the length of their replacement first term in order to limit concurrent future turnover.

(e) Up to \$300,000 per year, with adjustments for inflation based on the Consumer Price Index for San Diego County, may be expended for activities related to the Committee.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G (CONTINUED)

Section 5. Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The voters of San Diego County hereby declare they would have passed and adopted this Ordinance and each and all provisions hereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more of said provisions be declared invalid.

Section 6. Liberal Construction

This measure is an exercise of the initiative power of the People of the County of San Diego to implement a special tax to fund the purposes set forth in the Ordinance, and it shall be liberally construed to effectuate these purposes.

Section 7. Amendments

The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended only upon approval by the voters.

Section 8. Conflicting Measures

This measure is intended to be comprehensive. It is the intent of the People of the County of San Diego that, in the event this measure and one or more measures relating to a special tax to fund transportation infrastructure shall appear on the same ballot, the provisions of the other measure or measures shall be deemed in conflict with this measure. In the event that this measure receives a greater number of affirmative votes, the provisions of this measure shall prevail in their entirety, and all provisions of the other measure or measures shall be null and void.

AMENDMENTS TO CHARTER SECTION 66 REGARDING BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTIONS.

Shall Charter section 66 be amended to eliminate the primary election when two or fewer candidates for particular seat for the Board of Education of the San Diego Unified School District, including write-in candidates, qualify for the primary election, with the qualifying candidates automatically moving forward to the general election?

This measure requires approval of a Simple Majority (50%+1) of those voting on the measure.

OFFICIAL TITLE AND BALLOT SUMMARY

BALLOT TITLE

Amendments to San Diego Charter Section 66 Regarding Board of Education Elections.

BALLOT SUMMARY

This measure would amend San Diego Charter (Charter) section 66 to change, in certain circumstances, the election of members of the Board of Education (School Board) for the San Diego Unified School District (School District). If two or fewer candidates, including write-in candidates who meet the requirements set out in the San Diego Municipal Code (Municipal Code), qualify to run for a particular School Board seat in a Municipal Primary Election (Primary), voters will vote on that seat at the Municipal General Election (General Election) and not the Primary. For example, if only two candidates qualified to run for a particular School Board seat in the Primary, both candidates would automatically proceed to the General Election and would not be voted on at the Primary.

The City Council placed the measure on the ballot. Passage of this measure requires the affirmative majority vote of those qualified electors registered within the legal boundaries of the School District voting on the matter at the Municipal Special Election. Under Article IX, section 16(b) of the California Constitution, only those voters registered to vote within the geographic boundaries of the School District may vote on a City Charter amendment regarding School Board members, their removal from office, and their election. If approved by a majority vote of those qualified to vote on the measure, the Charter amendments would become effective after they are chaptered by the California Secretary of State.

CITY ATTORNEY IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

Charter section 66 governs the composition and elections of the School Board. In 2020, voters approved amendments to Charter section 66 which changed the election of members from a district-wide vote to individual district-based elections and amended the elections process when there is a vacancy on the School Board. Under Charter section 66, the two candidates that qualify to run for a particular School Board seat and receive the most votes in the Primary advance to the General Election. Under this Charter language, when there are only two candidates on the ballot for a School Board seat in the Primary, those two candidates must run twice: first in the Primary and again in the General Election. A candidate running unopposed for a School Board seat must also run twice, in the Primary and the General Election.

Under the proposed amendments, if two or fewer candidates, including write-in candidates who meet the requirements for write-in candidates in the

Municipal Code, qualify to run for a particular School Board seat in the Primary, voters will vote on that seat at the General Election and not the Primary. For example, if only two candidates qualified to run for a particular School Board seat, both candidates would automatically proceed to the General Election and would not be voted on at the Primary.

The proposed amendments were proposed by the School Board as part of the Council Policy 000-21 process, and were heard by the City Council's Rules Committee on April 18, 2024, and again on June 5, 2024. The City Council voted to place this measure on the ballot.

Passage of this measure requires the affirmative majority vote of those qualified electors registered within the legal boundaries of the School District voting on the matter at the Municipal Special Election. Under Article IX, section 16(b) of the California Constitution, only those voters registered to vote within the geographic boundaries of the School District may vote on a City Charter amendment regarding School Board members, their removal from office, and their election.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

MEASURE C. AMENDMENTS TO CHARTER SECTION 66 REGARDING BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTIONS

This measure would amend the San Diego City Charter to eliminate the Municipal Primary Election to fill a San Diego Board of Education (Board) seat up for election when there are two or fewer candidates who qualify to participate in the election. Instead, the Board seat would be voted upon at the Municipal General Election. For context, Municipal Primary and General Elections are often consolidated with the respective State of California elections.

Currently, Board member candidates are voted upon at both the primary and the general election. The top two candidates with the most votes in the primary election advance to the general election, even when there are only two candidates or when a candidate is running unopposed.

Eliminating the primary election for a Board member seat that has two or fewer candidates would save the San Diego Unified School District approximately \$130,000 per seat. This was the approximate cost in the March 2024 primary election associated with holding Board member elections for each of the three seats up for election; in which two incumbent candidates ran unopposed, and the third seat had only two candidates. Since the San Diego Unified School District pays the San Diego Registrar of Voters for election costs, there are no fiscal impacts to the City of San Diego.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE C

YES ON MEASURE C Strengthen Democracy. Strengthen Our Schools.

Measure C is a clean, common-sense elections reform that strengthens local democracy and strengthens our public schools.

Currently, even if only two candidates or fewer run for a San Diego School Board seat, we hold both Primary *and* General elections. It's confusing, costly, and easily manipulated by special interest schemes. Measure C fixes this by ensuring elections are decided only in November when a majority votes.

Measure C: Hold One-on-One Elections When Most People Vote

- The current system lets special interests tilt elections with big spending in low-turnout primaries that yield warped, undemocratic results. Measure C moves one-on-one elections to November, when most voters cast ballots, limiting election manipulation and ensuring a true majority chooses our local leaders.

ARTICLE VI

BOARD OF EDUCATION

SECTION 66: BOARD OF EDUCATION

The government of the San Diego Unified School District shall be vested in a Board of Education, composed of five members who shall be nominated and elected by the registered voters of the individual Board of Education District for which they are a candidate. Board of Education elections will be held at the regular Municipal Primary Elections and Municipal General Elections, at the same time as the election of Councilmembers. At the Municipal Primary Election, the registered voters of an individual Board of Education District shall nominate two candidates to fill the office of their Board of Education member in a District whose term expires the following December. When more than two candidates, including write-in candidates, qualify for a particular office in the Municipal Primary Election, the top two candidates receiving the highest number of votes vote getters for a particular office in the Municipal Primary Election for an individual seat will advance to the Municipal General Election. Write-in candidates may participate in the Municipal Primary Election if they meet the requirements for write-in candidates for the Board of Education set forth in the San Diego Municipal Code. If two or fewer candidates, including write-in candidates, qualify to participate in the Municipal Primary Election for a particular elective office, the office shall be voted upon at the Municipal General Election and not the Municipal Primary Election and the names of the write-in candidate(s) who qualified to participate in the Municipal Primary Election shall be printed on the Municipal General Election ballot as qualified candidates. At the Municipal General Election, the registered voters of the individual Board of Education District shall select one of the nominees to fill the seat. Each candidate for the Board of Education shall have been a registered voter of the San Diego Unified School District and an actual resident of the election district from which the candidate seeks to be nominated for thirty (30) days immediately preceding the filing of a nomination petition. The members shall serve for a term of four years from and after 10 a.m. the first Monday after the first day of December next succeeding this election and until their successors are elected and qualified, except as herein provided.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Charter, and commencing in 2020, no person shall serve more than three four-year terms as a member of the Board of Education. Board members who hold the office as of the date of the Municipal General Election in 2020 shall not have prior or current terms counted for purposes of applying this term limit provision.

Article XVI of this Charter shall govern: (1) when a vacancy in the office of member of the Board of Education shall be deemed to occur, and (2) when a member of the Board of Education shall be removed for cause.

Vacancies for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be filled as provided in this Charter section.

Any vacancy occurring on the Board shall be filled from the election district in which the vacancy occurs, by appointment by the remaining Board members; but in the event that the remaining members fail to fill such vacancy by appointment within thirty (30) days after the vacancy occurs, they must immediately cause to be held a primary election and a general election as set forth in this section to fill such vacancy; provided, however, that any person appointed to fill such vacancy shall hold office only until the next regular municipal election, at which date a person shall be elected to serve for the remainder of such unexpired term.

For the purpose of electing members of the Board of Education, the San Diego Unified School District shall be divided into five (5) districts as nearly equal in registered voter population as practicable. For the first primary and regular election held under this section, as amended, the boundaries of such election districts shall be established by the Board of Education as such Board existed on the effective date of the amendment to this section. Thereafter, the boundaries of such election districts shall be subject to alteration and change under the provisions of this section. The Board of Education, by resolution, may change and alter the boundaries of the election districts and in the resolution may describe the new boundaries by reference to a map on file in the office of the City Clerk; a metes and bounds description of the new boundaries need not be contained in the resolution.

MEASURE D

ADDING CHARTER SECTION 41.3 AND AMENDING SECTION 41 TO STRENGTHEN THE INDEPENDENCE OF THE ETHICS COMMISSION.

Shall Charter section 41.3 be added so the Ethics Commission, which regulates City officials, candidates for City office, lobbyists, and consultants, can be eliminated only by voters, appoints its own Executive Director without Council confirmation, independently initiates its own investigations and law enforcement referrals, has defined qualifications and term limits, and is provided sufficient resources?

This measure requires approval of a Simple Majority (50%+1) of those voting on the measure.

OFFICIAL TITLE AND BALLOT SUMMARY

BALLOT TITLE

Amendments to the San Diego Charter to Strengthen the Independence of the Ethics Commission.

BALLOT SUMMARY

This measure would amend the San Diego Charter (Charter) by removing the Ethics Commission (Commission) from Charter section 41 and placing those provisions in a new Charter section dedicated solely to the Commission.

If approved by voters, new Charter section 41.3 would describe the Commission and its responsibilities and those of the Commission's Executive Director. Only voters could eliminate the Commission or diminish its authority or responsibilities. The new section would establish the number of Commission members (Commissioners), their qualifications, and their length of service. Commissioners would hire their own Executive Director and establish their own complaint and investigation procedures without City Council confirmation. The City Council would be required to provide the Commission with sufficient resources to perform its responsibilities. The Executive Director could refer evidence of possible unlawful conduct to law enforcement at any time.

The ballot measure was proposed by City Attorney Mara W. Elliott during the process in which proposals are submitted for consideration by a City Council standing committee and then the full City Council. The City Council voted to place it on the ballot.

If approved by a majority of those qualified to vote on the measure, the Charter amendments would become effective after they are chaptered by the California Secretary of State.

CITY ATTORNEY IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

The San Diego City Council (City Council) adopted San Diego Ordinance O-18945 (June 5, 2001) establishing the Ethics Commission (Commission). The Commission is charged with investigating and enforcing City governmental ethics laws involving current and former elected City officials, candidates for City office, certain City employees, consultants, lobbyists, and members of City boards and commissions who are required to file conflict of interest disclosure forms.

Currently, the Mayor appoints all seven Commission members from a pool of nominees submitted by members of the City Council and the City Attorney, who are then subject to confirmation by a City Council majority. The City Council confirms the appointment of the Commission's Executive

Director; approves the Commission's complaint and investigation procedures; and controls the Commission's budget.

If the proposed Charter amendments are approved, only City voters would disband the Commission. The amendments would establish the number of Commission members (Commissioners), their qualifications, and their length of service, and the City Council would update the San Diego Municipal Code to establish a process to appoint Commissioners. The amendments would authorize the Commission to hire its own Executive Director and establish its own complaint and investigation procedures without City Council confirmation. The amendments would also empower the Executive Director to initiate investigations and complaints, compel witness attendance, testimony, and records production, and to report evidence of possible unlawful conduct to other government or law enforcement agencies during an investigation. The City Council would be required to allocate sufficient funds for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities and to retain legal counsel.

A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of amending the Charter relating to the Ethics Commission. A "No" vote is a vote against the amendments.

If approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting in favor of the measure, the Charter amendments would become effective after they are chaptered by the California Secretary of State.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

MEASURE D. ADDING CHARTER SECTION 41.3 AND AMENDING SECTION 41 TO STRENGTHEN THE INDEPENDENCE OF THE ETHICS COMMISSION

This measure would remove nearly all existing references to the Ethics Commission (Commission) in the San Diego Charter (Charter) and recast those provisions in a new Charter section that solely governs the Commission. The Commission is charged with: administering and enforcing the City of San Diego's (City) governmental ethics laws and proposing reforms, conducting investigations, imposing fines, referring certain complaints to appropriate enforcement agencies, auditing campaign committees, and advising and educating elected officials, City employees, candidates, campaign committees, and lobbyists about governmental ethics laws.

The Ethics Commission is funded by the City's General Fund currently totaling \$1.8 million, and any unused budgeted funds in a given year are returned to the General Fund. The Commission also imposes fines on violators, which are deposited into the City's General Fund but do not factor into the Commission's budget. All funds for legal counsel and enforcement hearings come out of the Commission's allotted contracts budget.

While this measure would make several changes, this analysis focuses on two amendments that would have fiscal implications.

The measure requires the City Council to allocate sufficient funds for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities. **Based on actual expenditures for each of the last ten years, an additional approximately \$65,000 would bring the Commission's contract budget to a level equal to its highest annual expenditure during that period.** This budget increase would decrease the possibility of the Commission needing to request additional funding from the Mayor and City Council during any given fiscal year. As stated above, any funds budgeted each year for the Ethics Commission that are not spent would be returned to the City's General Fund.

The measure also provides the Commission authority to retain *additional* legal counsel, if needed. Voters have previously authorized the Commission to retain its own legal counsel, independent of the San Diego City Attorney, for legal support in carrying out its responsibilities. It is anticipated that additional legal counsel beyond the Commission's usual outside counsel would be needed only in rare circumstances, due to conflicts, a need for specific expertise, or when certain cases advance to a hearing.

To the extent the Commission's responsibilities are expanded in the future, additional funding would be needed.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D

This good governance measure strengthens the independence of the City of San Diego's Ethics Commission by empowering it to control its investigations and resources without political interference.

The Commission is the City's watchdog for violations of ethics, lobbying, and campaign finance laws. It educates and regulates elected officials, lobbyists, campaigns, certain City employees and City consultants, and imposes penalties and fines when violations occur. This measure will bolster the Commission's ability to hold accountable those it regulates, protecting the interests of the City and its residents.

To regulate fairly and effectively, the Commission must be independent from those it regulates; however, the City's Charter authorizes City Council control over the Commission. The Council determines its budget and resources; confirms the appointment of its Executive Director; can eliminate the Commission or reduce its responsibilities; and approves its complaint and investigation procedures.

To maintain the public's confidence and ensure the Commission's independence, the Charter must be changed to empower our City's ethics watchdog. Those who are regulated by the Commission should not have control over its funding, procedures for holding individuals accountable, or its ability to do its work.

A yes for this measure:

- Cements the Commission's existence in the Charter.
- Defines the Commission's responsibilities, qualifications, and term limits.
- Vests power in the Commission to subpoena witnesses and records, compel attendance and testimony, and conduct investigations.
- Empowers the Commission to hire its Executive Director without Council confirmation.
- Authorizes the Commission's Executive Director to make all hiring decisions.
- Protects the Commission's ability to do its work by ensuring it has sufficient resources.
- Authorizes the Commission to divulge evidence of possible unlawful conduct to other government or law enforcement agencies during an investigation.

These commonsense amendments are intended to ensure our government is more ethical, transparent, and accountable.

Ethics Commission

ARTICLE V

EXECUTIVE AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICE

SECTION 41: COMMISSIONS

The Mayor shall appoint, subject to the confirmation of the Council, members of all commissions, established pursuant to this section, except the members of the Commission on Police Practices and the Ethics Commission, whose appointment and service are governed by Sections 41.2 and 41.3 of this Charter. Whenever the Mayor does not appoint a member within forty-five (45) days after a vacancy occurs, the Council shall make such appointment. The commissioners shall be limited to two (2) full consecutive terms, with one (1) term intervening before they become eligible for reappointment; and this provision shall apply to anyone who has served two (2) full consecutive terms by January 1972. The terms of commissioners may extend beyond the elective term of the appointing Mayor. The Mayor shall fill, subject to the confirmation of the Council, any vacancy and such appointment shall be for the unexpired term of the office being filled. The City Council may remove a member of the Civil Service Commission for cause by vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the Council. However, before the Council may remove a member of the Civil Service Commission, written charges shall be made against the commission member and an opportunity afforded for public hearing before the Council upon such charges. The City Council may remove members of all other commissions established pursuant to this section for cause by vote of a majority of the members of the Council.

(a) Funds Commission. This Commission shall have supervision and control over all trust, perpetuity, and investment funds of the City and such pension funds as shall be placed in its custody, and shall administer them subject to the laws of the State and ordinances of the Council. The membership of this Commission shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Council and shall be one bank official, two unclassified citizens, and the City Attorney and City Treasurer, ex officio. They shall serve without compensation for terms of four (4) years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, appointments shall be made so that not more than one (1) term of office shall expire in any year.

(b) Civil Service Commission. There shall be a Civil Service Commission consisting of five members who shall be electors of the City. Not more than three members of the Commission shall be of the same sex. The Mayor, with the approval of the Council, shall appoint the members of the Commission. The members of the Commission shall be appointed to serve for five years and until their successors have been appointed and qualified. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, appointments shall be made so that not more than one (1) term of office shall expire in any year. The Mayor, with the approval of the Council, shall fill any vacancy.

Members of the Civil Service Commission shall not hold any other office in City Government.

(c) City Planning Commission. The City Planning Commission shall be organized as provided by the laws of the State and have such powers and perform such duties as are prescribed by such laws. The duties of the Commission shall also include advising upon public buildings, bridges, retaining walls, approaches, park and harbor structures, the improvement of Pueblo lands and such other improvements as the Council may by

ordinance determine. The Commission shall consist of seven (7) members appointed by the Mayor, subject to the confirmation of the Council. The City Engineer, and the City Attorney, or their designated representatives, shall be members ex officio, but neither of said officers shall have a vote. The members of this Commission shall serve without compensation for terms of four years and until their successors are elected and appointed and qualified.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this section, appointments to this Commission shall be made so that not more than three (3) members are appointed in any one year. To accomplish this, initial appointments to this Commission, after the effective date of this amendment, shall be made so as to provide that the terms of office of two (2) members shall be for four (4) years; two (2) members for three (3) years; two (2) members for two years; and one (1) member for one (1) year.

- (d) ~~Ethics Commission. For so long as an Ethics Commission remains established by ordinance of the Council, the Executive Director of the Commission shall be appointed by the Commission, subject to confirmation by the Council, and shall thereafter serve at the direction and pleasure of the Commission. The Commission may, in accordance with complaint and investigation procedures approved by ordinance of the Council, subpoena witnesses, compel their attendance and testimony, administer oaths and affirmations, take evidence and require by subpoena the production of any books, papers, records, or other items material to the performance of the Commission's duties or exercise of its powers. The Ethics Commission shall be authorized to retain its own legal counsel, independent of the City Attorney, for legal support and guidance in carrying out its responsibilities and duties.~~

SECTION 41.3: ETHICS COMMISSION

The Ethics Commission is an independent body that monitors, administers, and enforces the City's governmental ethics laws, proposes new governmental ethics law reforms, conducts investigations, refers violations to appropriate government and law enforcement agencies, audits disclosure statements, and advises and educates City officials and the public about governmental ethics laws. The City Council may, by ordinance, mandate additional duties and discretionary powers consistent with this section and applicable state and federal law.

This Charter provision and the implementing ordinance shall control the appointment process to the Ethics Commission. The Commission shall consist of seven members who are appointed and removed by procedures approved by ordinance of the Council. The Commission must possess the independence, experience, and technical expertise necessary to carry out the duties of the Commission. Members of the Commission shall serve for terms of four years and until their successors have been appointed and qualified. Members of the Commission are limited to two full consecutive terms, with at least one term intervening before they become eligible for reappointment.

The Commission shall appoint an Executive Director who shall serve at the direction and pleasure of the Commission. The Executive Director is the appointing authority for all City personnel authorized in the department through the normal annual budget and appropriation process of the City. The Executive Director, who shall act in accordance with policies and regulations adopted by the Ethics Commission and with applicable law, is authorized to initiate investigations and complaints, subpoena witnesses, compel their attendance and testimony, administer oaths and affirmations, take evidence, and require by subpoena the production of any books, papers,

records, or other items material to the performance of the Commission's duties or exercise of its powers.

The Commission shall be authorized to retain its own legal counsel, independent of the City Attorney, for legal support and guidance in carrying out its responsibilities and duties, and to retain additional legal counsel to handle cases within its jurisdiction. City Council shall allocate funds sufficient for the Commission to carry out the responsibilities described herein. The Executive Director may refer a matter and divulge evidence of possible unlawful conduct discovered during an investigation to another governmental or law enforcement agency for appropriate action at any time.

MEASURE E

CITY OF SAN DIEGO SALES TAX

To invest in neighborhood upgrades which can include fixing potholes, repairing streets, sidewalks, and streetlights, improving parks and libraries, updating police, fire, paramedic, and 9-1-1 response, and providing infrastructure and delivering general services across San Diego neighborhoods, shall the measure enacting a one-cent sales tax be adopted, generating approximately \$400,000,000 per year until ended by voters, requiring citizen oversight and independent audits, with all funds staying in the City of San Diego?

This measure requires approval of a Simple Majority (50%+1) of those voting on the measure.

OFFICIAL TITLE AND BALLOT SUMMARY

BALLOT TITLE

City of San Diego Sales Tax.

BALLOT SUMMARY

The City of San Diego (City) currently receives 1.00% (i.e., one cent per sale or use transaction) of the total 7.75% sales tax rate (Current Sales Tax) charged on transactions occurring within the City. According to the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, the City's Current Sales Tax is tied for the fourth lowest out of the 482 individual cities in the State, and 9 of the 18 cities in San Diego County have a higher sales tax than the City.

This measure would amend the Municipal Code by adding Chapter 3, Article 2, Division 1, sections 32.0101 through 32.0120, relating to a General Transactions and Use Tax, to provide for the imposition and collection of a new one-cent transactions and use tax (i.e., a sales tax). The new tax is projected to generate approximately \$400 million of unrestricted annual revenue to the City's General Fund which can be used for infrastructure projects, core services, and general City needs.

In its Fiscal Year 2025-2029 Five-Year Capital Infrastructure Planning Outlook, the City has identified critical infrastructure maintenance and construction needs in areas such as the City's roads, sidewalks, streetlights, parks, libraries, and other facilities totaling \$9.25 billion over the next five fiscal years, which amount does not include the costs of maintaining public safety services like police, fire, and emergency services.

The City Council placed the measure on the ballot and it will pass if it is approved by a majority vote of those qualified voters who vote on the measure. The amendments would take effect after the results of the election are certified by a resolution of the City Council. If adopted, collection of the tax is expected to commence April 1, 2025.

CITY ATTORNEY IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

The City of San Diego (City) placed Measure E on the ballot for the voters to decide whether to amend the Municipal Code to add a one percent (1.00%) general transactions and use tax (commonly known as a "sales tax") to the retail sales price, or one cent for an item that costs one dollar. Currently, the tax on retail sales within the City is 7.75%, of which the City receives 1.00% (i.e., one cent per transaction) directly from the State.

The City estimates that the 1.00% tax increase proposed by this measure would result in additional revenue of approximately \$400 million annually to

the City until repealed by the voters. The revenues from the tax increase would supplement, not replace, existing expenditures from the City's General Fund.

This is a "general tax," not a "special tax," because this measure does not legally restrict the use of tax revenue to any specific purposes. The proceeds may be used for general municipal services and all lawful public purposes including, but not limited to, providing public safety services; repairing and maintaining public infrastructure such as streets, sidewalks, and storm drains; and maintaining or improving upon the level of City services to residents.

On July 22, 2024, City Council approved the ordinance for submittal to the voters. If approved by a majority of the voters at the November 5, 2024 election, as authorized by California law, the City will levy the proposed one cent per dollar tax on the sale or use of all tangible personal property sold at retail within the City, with certain exceptions. The tax would be collected in the same manner and at the same time as existing sales taxes. Proceeds will be deposited into the City's General Fund and subject to the same independent annual audit as other General Fund revenue. An accounting of revenues received and expenditures made from the tax will be presented annually to the City Council and made available for public review through the City's annual budgetary process.

A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of the tax. A "No" vote is a vote against the tax. Measure E will be approved if it receives a simple majority of "Yes" votes. If this measure is approved, the current 7.75% total sales tax rate within the City will increase by 1.0% to 8.75%.

This measure was proposed by Mayor Todd Gloria and City Councilmember Raul Campillo, and the City Council voted to place it on the ballot. If approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting on the measure, the Municipal Code would be amended after the election results are certified by a resolution of the City Council. If adopted, the collection of the tax increase is expected to commence on April 1, 2025, and the measure will remain in effect until amended or repealed by the voters.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

MEASURE E. CITY OF SAN DIEGO SALES TAX

This measure would increase the transactions and use tax, commonly known as "sales tax," within the City of San Diego (City) by 1 cent on each dollar subject to sales tax once operative on April 1, 2025. Currently, the sales tax rate in the City is 7.75%, of which the City receives 1.00% (equal to 1 cent on each dollar of taxable sales) and the remainder is allocated among other local and state entities. Under the measure, the sales tax rate in the City would increase to 8.75%, of which the City would generally receive 2.00% (equal to 2 cents on each dollar of taxable sales).

If this measure passes, the City would receive estimated additional revenue ranging between \$360 million (conservative), and \$400 million or more (optimistic) in the first year of implementation. This new revenue stream range is based on current economic assumptions, consumer behavior, and tax law and it is anticipated to grow moderately in future years. Future annual revenue would vary based on actual sales activity, economic conditions, and changes to tax law.

All revenue collected under the measure would be available for unrestricted general purposes and deposited into the City's General Fund. The City anticipates using funds to support new and existing infrastructure, such as streets, sidewalks, streetlights, flood prevention and water quality systems. These funds are also anticipated to help address the City's significant infrastructure backlog, which will continue to grow at an increasing rate, with higher costs expected in the future if not addressed. Revenue would also support operating costs, including but not limited to public safety and emergency response, such as police, fire, paramedic, and 9-1-1 response services; neighborhood services, such as libraries and parks; and internal support services, such as finance, legal, and human resources.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT (CONTINUED)

If this measure does not pass, the City would not receive the additional revenue noted above. The City is currently operating with an approximately \$200 million structural budget deficit, whereby ongoing costs exceed existing ongoing revenues. To balance the current year's budget, the City took several budget mitigation actions to generate additional one-time funds and/or temporarily reduce expenses. When those actions expire after this fiscal year, the City will lack the ongoing funds needed to support its current operations and will continue to be unable to address its infrastructure backlog. Balancing future budgets would require the City to make more severe and permanent operational cuts, while the City's infrastructure backlog would continue to grow.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE E

Chapter 3

Article 2: Sales Tax

Division 1: General Transactions and Use Tax

§32.0101 Title

This Division shall be known as the San Diego General Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance and shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

§32.0102 Operative Date

"Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance, the date of such adoption being as set forth below.

§32.0103 Purpose

This ordinance is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted to accomplish those purposes:

- (a) To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code and section 7285.9 of Part 1.7 of Division 2 which authorizes the City to adopt this tax ordinance which shall be operative if a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve the imposition of the tax at an election called for that purpose.
- (b) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- (c) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure therefore that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.
- (d) To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this ordinance.

§32.0104 Contract with State

Prior to the Operative Date, the City shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax ordinance; provided, that if the City shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the Operative Date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the Operative Date shall be the first day of

the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

§32.0105 Transactions Tax Rate

For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated territory of the City at the rate of one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the *Operative Date* of this ordinance.

§32.0106 Place of Sale

For the purposes of this ordinance, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

§32.0107 Use Tax Rate

An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use, or other consumption in the City of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the *Operative Date* of this ordinance for storage, use, or other consumption in said territory at the rate of one percent (1%) of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

§32.0108 Adoption of Provisions of State Law

Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance as though fully set forth herein.

§32.0109 Limitations on Adoption of State Law and Collection of Use Taxes

In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

(a) Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this City shall be substituted therefor. However, the substitution shall not be made when:

(1) The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California;

(2) The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this City or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this ordinance.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE E (CONTINUED)

(3) In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:

(A) Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use, or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use, or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;

(B) Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use, or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the State under the said provision of that code.

(4) In sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797, or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(b) The word "City" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in section 6203.

(1) "A retailer engaged in business in the District" shall also include any retailer that, in the preceding calendar year or the current calendar year, has total combined sales of tangible personal property in this state or for delivery in the State by the retailer and all persons related to the retailer that exceeds five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). For purposes of this section, a person is related to another person if both persons are related to each other pursuant to section 267(b) of Title 26 of the United States Code and the regulations thereunder.

§32.0110 Permit Not Required

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this ordinance.

§32.0111 Exemptions and Exclusions

(a) There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

(b) There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:

(1) Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the county in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.

- (2) Sales of property to be used outside the City that is shipped to a point outside the City, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the City shall be satisfied:
- (A) With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-City address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and
- (B) With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-City and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.
- (3) The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the *Operative Date* of this ordinance.
- (4) A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the *Operative Date* of this ordinance.
- (5) For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- (c) There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this ordinance, the storage, use, or other consumption in this City of tangible personal property:
- (1) The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.
- (2) Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE E (CONTINUED)

- (3) If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the *Operative Date* of this ordinance.
- (4) If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the *Operative Date* of this ordinance.
- (5) For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- (6) Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the City shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the City or participates within the City in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the City or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the City under the authority of the retailer.
- (7) “A retailer engaged in business in the City” shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the City.
- (d) Any person subject to use tax under this ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use, or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax

§32.012 Amendments of Revenue and Taxation Code

All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this ordinance, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this ordinance.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE E (CONTINUED)

§32.0113 Enjoining Collection Forbidden

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action, or proceeding in any court against the State or the City, or against any officer of the State or the City, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this ordinance, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

§32.0114 Amendments by City Council

After the effective date of this ordinance, any proposed amendment to this ordinance must be approved by the voters of the City if the amendment involves: increasing the tax rate; revising the methodology for calculating the tax such that a tax increase would result or imposing the tax on transactions and uses not previously subject to the tax (unless such amendment occurs automatically by operation of law); reducing the tax; or terminating the tax. The City Council may otherwise amend this ordinance without submitting the amendment to the voters for approval in any manner that does not constitute a tax "increase" as that term is defined in Government Code section 53750(h).

§32.0115 Use of Proceeds

The proceeds from the tax imposed by this ordinance shall be for unrestricted general revenue purposes of the City and shall be received into the General Fund of the City. Nothing in this ordinance shall establish the tax imposed under this ordinance as a special tax or bind the City to use the proceeds for any specific purpose or function. The Mayor and City Council shall retain discretion to expend the proceeds of the tax for any lawful purpose of the City.

§32.0116 Citizen Oversight

Public oversight of the City's annual expenditures of the proceeds of the transactions and use tax under this ordinance shall be accomplished through the City's current budgetary process. The City's Department of Finance provides periodic budgetary updates throughout the year, and each fiscal year's budget is developed through a process involving multiple public hearings allowing City Council and public participation.

§32.0117 Independent Annual Audit

The proceeds resulting from the transactions and use tax under this ordinance shall be subject to the same independent annual audit requirements as other General Fund revenue. The City's annual financial statements, which are subject to audit procedures performed by an auditor independent of the City, will include the revenues received and expenditures made from the proceeds resulting from this transactions and use tax, and will be presented annually to the City's Audit Committee and City Council at publicly-noticed meetings, and be made available for public review.

§32.0118 Severability

If any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

§32.0119 Effective Date

This ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City transactions and use taxes and shall take effect immediately.

§32.0120 Termination Date

The authority to levy the tax imposed by this ordinance shall continue indefinitely until terminated by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting on a new measure at a regularly scheduled municipal election.

This measure requires approval of 55% of those voting on the measure.

COUNTY COUNSEL IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

The Board of Education for the San Diego Community College District ("District") placed this measure on the ballot. If approved by 55% of the votes cast, this measure will authorize the District to issue and sell general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3.5 billion. The bonds may be issued in several series and mature in a maximum of 40 years. The interest rate on the bonds would not exceed statutory limits.

Approval of this measure will authorize a levy on the assessed value of taxable property within the District in an amount needed to pay the principal and interest on the bonds each year the bonds are outstanding. The District estimates the average tax rate to fund this bond will be \$23.77 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, and the highest tax rate will be \$25.00 for every \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The estimated final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2073. The total debt service, including principal and interest, required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$7.7 billion. These amounts are estimates. Actual amounts may vary depending on the timing of sales, amount of bonds sold at each sale, and assessed valuation.

The measure identifies a list of projects at schools and facilities within the District that may be funded from the bond proceeds. Approval of this measure does not guarantee the proposed projects will be funded by the sale of the bonds. The District's proposal for certain projects may assume receipt of matching State funds subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

The measure includes provisions to demonstrate compliance with State law regarding school bonds, as follows:

- (1) the proceeds from the sale of the bonds may be used only for the purposes specified,
- (2) the District will establish an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure bond proceeds are spent only on projects listed in the measure, and

- (3) the District shall conduct an annual performance and financial audit to ensure funds have been expended on the projects listed.

A "YES" vote is in favor of authorizing the District to issue and sell \$3.5 billion in general obligation bonds.

A "NO" vote is against authorizing the District to issue and sell \$3.5 billion in general obligation bonds.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, AFFORDABLE EDUCATION, CAREERS MEASURE

An election will be held in the San Diego Community College District (the "District") on November 5, 2024, to authorize the sale of up to \$3.5 billion in general obligation bonds to finance improvements for District classrooms and facilities, as described in the measure. If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem* tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the California Elections Code. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the District's assessed valuation, the following information is provided:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$23.77 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is Fiscal Year 2073.
2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$25.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. It is estimated that such rate would be levied in Fiscal Years 2025-26 through 2072-2073.
3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$7.7 billion.

Voters should note the estimated tax rate is based on the assessed value (not the market value) of taxable property on San Diego County's official tax rolls. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts or durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary from those used to provide the estimates set forth above, due to factors such as variations in the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold and market interest rates available at the time of each sale, actual assessed valuations over the term of the bonds, and other factors. The date and amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on conditions in the bond market at the time of sale. Actual future assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as

BACKGROUND

The Board of Trustees of the San Diego Community College District, to be responsive to the needs of students and the community, evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including providing sufficient classrooms and laboratories to offer more courses and programs to students close to home, facility maintenance, safety enhancements, class size and offerings, energy cost reduction, and information and computer technology, as outlined in the Master Plan Facilities Needs List, and as amended from time to time. In developing the scope of projects, the faculty, staff, and students have prioritized the essential health and safety requirements to address the most critical demands and the most urgent and basic facility needs and repairs that will make City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and the College of Continuing Education clean and safe for learning. The Board conducted facilities evaluations and received public input and review in developing the scope of college facility projects to be funded, as listed in the Master Plan Facilities Needs List. The Chancellor received input from faculty, business, industry, and workforce development partners and concluded that if these needs were not addressed now, the facility problems would only get worse.

In implementing the Master Plan Facilities Needs List, the Board determines that the San Diego Community College District must:

- Due to the high costs of attending public and private universities, City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and the College of Continuing Education must provide a high-quality, affordable education to local students who might otherwise be denied the opportunity to receive job training or a college education.
- City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and the College of Continuing Education must provide a positive alternative for students who want to work and go to school, seek vocational training, or for workers who need to learn new or enhanced job skills later in life.
- Expand classrooms and laboratories that provide advanced and/or state-of-the-art training for high-demand workforce jobs in San Diego's high-technology industries, including computer science, cybersecurity, biotechnology, nursing, and emergency first responders, and for skilled high-wage jobs in manufacturing, building trades, and other growing industries.
- Renovate existing classrooms, science and learning laboratories, and vocational training facilities to ensure they are safe, energy efficient, and provide access to state-of-the-art equipment, computers, and instructional technology.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE HH (CONTINUED)

- Provide safe classroom facilities throughout the areas served by City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and the College of Continuing Education to enable more local students to transfer to four-year colleges and universities.

The Master Facilities Needs List, which includes the types of projects listed below, is on file and available for review at the Operations, Enterprise Services, and Facilities office at the District's main office.

The list is designed to describe the many repairs, renovations, and improvements now critically needed for District facilities to complete the facilities master plans for all District campuses. The descriptions of individual buildings and facilities are expected to be refined as the District's development plans are completed. The final design of buildings and facilities may vary from these descriptions. As projects are more fully developed, specific designs may be refined by the District's development review team—drawn from the Colleges. Final designs will conform to all applicable code requirements. Where applicable, the suggested sizes of buildings are indicated in Assignable Square Feet (ASF).

Listed building, repair, rehabilitation projects, and upgrades will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses, and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. The allocation of bond proceeds will be affected by the District's receipt of State bond funds and the final costs of each project. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded, and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for modernization may be required if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. There will be necessary site preparation/restoration in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees, and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property.

If any of the projects listed below are not constructed using the bond funds, the funds will remain with the District and approved by the Board for use with other Districtwide projects.

PROJECTS

SAN DIEGO CITY COLLEGE

The bond-funded facilities projects at San Diego City College would include but not be limited to:

PROJECT I: Replace a 50-year-old building to allow the construction of a new Campus Commons that will serve as a hub for campus life and student activities. The new Commons will include amenities that address college priorities for student health and wellness and will include student dining areas, student gathering venues, and study rooms with communal spaces that will support a variety of campus events and programs.

PROJECT II: Replacement of the 50-year-old Saville Theatre with a new state-of-the-art Stagecraft, Multimedia, and Performance Center that would include a large lecture hall and performance space designed with innovative sound, lighting, and stage technologies to support teaching of performance and multimedia skills as well as presentations, lectures, workshops, master classes, and community events.

PROJECT III: Repair and modernize degraded exercise science facilities to provide safe venues for student learning with improved air quality, temperature control, asbestos removal, electrical upgrades, and technology improvements.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE HH (CONTINUED)

PROJECT IV: Modernize the college's degraded utility infrastructure and Central Plant with current energy-efficient technologies and systems to help reduce utility costs and ensure reliable access to essential heating, cooling, and electrical utilities crucial for maintaining a safe, quality learning environment and supporting campus and community activities.

PROJECT V: Construction of an affordable student residential village to help address widespread housing and homelessness issues and other barriers to educational access among City College students. This facility would include services to support student success such as referral services for academic counseling, mental health, and other student supports. The facility would provide close to 800 beds, including laundry, kitchen, living spaces, and a recreation area. Protected pedestrian pathways connecting the complex to the main campus would enhance access to other college facilities for resident students.

PROJECT VI: Construction of a new facility to support the expanding Seeds at City agriculture science program, to include classrooms, lecture halls, laboratories, greenhouses, field research areas, and space for showcasing sustainable practices. The project would allow the college to expand outreach to the community to provide workshops, field days, educational events, and continue to serve as a resource for fresh, local produce for underserved communities. The project would also involve the construction of new facilities to support the college maintenance and operations functions.

SAN DIEGO MESA COLLEGE

The bond-funded facilities projects at San Diego Mesa College would include but not be limited to:

PROJECT I: Demolition of degraded exercise science facilities, and construction of new facilities to expand kinesiology, health, athletics, and exercise science programs, with classrooms, indoor sports performance areas, and outdoor athletic areas that support student learning, sports programming and development, physical rehabilitation and clinical work, and community engagement through wellness workshops, health screenings, and recreational activities. The project would also include support and storage spaces. The facilities to be demolished were built in the 1960s and require extensive maintenance to support current conditions.

PROJECT II: Construction of a new aquatics center, replacing a 50-year-old obsolete facility. The new center would include a new energy efficient, modern aquatics system, restroom facility, and support facilities to serve and expand programs at Mesa College for lifeguard training, water safety instructor and other life/safety and aquatic safety training programs, and exercise science and health rehabilitation activities.

PROJECT III: Upgrades to the college's degraded utility infrastructure and Central Plant to allow for more sustainable practices with energy-efficient technologies and systems to help reduce utility costs and ensure reliable access to essential heating, cooling, and electrical utilities crucial for maintaining a quality learning environment and supporting campus and community activities.

PROJECT IV: Replacement of the obsolete Apolliad Theatre, built in 1962, with a new state-of-the-art educational facility designed with cutting-edge sound, lighting, and stage technologies that will include a variety of performance spaces, and a large lecture hall for campus and community events to include informative lectures, conferences and educational programs for students and community groups.

PROJECT V: Construction of a new Early Education Center dedicated to providing enriching, professionally supervised childcare, early child education services, and practicum training for SDCCD students qualifying for Childcare Professional certifications while also serving the children of students, faculty, and staff, supporting the developmental needs of children ranging from infants to preschoolers. The Center, which would replace an obsolete child development center, would serve as a practical training site for students studying early childhood education and related fields, allowing students to gain hands-on experience working with young children under the guidance of experienced educators.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE HH (CONTINUED)

PROJECT VI: Construction of a new Community Health Center to offer a range of healthcare services, such as preventive services, mental health support, dental screenings and services, and some primary care, to students, faculty, staff, and the local community. The Center would offer educational opportunities for students pursuing allied health careers and serve as an accessible and affordable healthcare option for those who may not have easy access to medical services elsewhere.

SAN DIEGO MIRAMAR COLLEGE

The bond-funded facilities projects at San Diego Miramar College include but not be limited to:

PROJECT I: Renovation and upgrade of Aviation and Aeronautical Sciences program aircraft storage facility with modern technology, climate control systems, and advanced maintenance equipment to ensure the safety and integrity of the aircraft used in training programs. This new facility would allow for expansion of job training for careers in the aviation industry.

PROJECT II: Construction of a new Early Childhood Education Center with interactive learning materials and technology, dedicated spaces for imaginative play, outdoor areas designed for exploration and physical development, and a secure drop-off zone. The Center would help meet local demand for early childhood educators, a field growing three times as fast as the average growth for all U.S. occupations, according to the Bureau of Labor.

PROJECT III: Construction of a new Stagecraft, Multimedia, and Performance Center for educational conferences and performance events. The Center would include a large lecture hall and performance space designed with innovative sound, lighting, and stage technologies to support presentations, lectures, workshops, master classes, and community events.

PROJECT IV: Modernize the college's degraded utility infrastructure and Central Plant to allow for more sustainable practices with energy-efficient technologies and systems to help reduce utility costs and ensure reliable access to essential heating, cooling, and electrical utilities crucial for maintaining a quality learning environment and supporting campus and community activities.

PROJECT V: Construction of a new English and Communication Arts Center to serve as a cultural hub with technologically advanced classrooms, multimedia studios, writing laboratories, editing suites, and a museum-quality gallery to display student and community artist work and exhibitions. The Center would replace an obsolete lecture hall building that does not meet current or future academic and career training needs.

PROJECT VI: Construction of a new College Welcome Center/Academic Resource Center to serve as a pivotal hub for prospective and current students, parents, visitors, and community members. It would provide a reception area, information desk, information resource center, lounge area, and designated spaces for hosting new student orientation programs and welcome events. The Center would be equipped with computer workstations and printers to promote completion of online applications and scheduling placement tests.

SAN DIEGO COLLEGE OF CONTINUING EDUCATION

The bond-funded projects for Continuing Education may include but not be limited to:

PROJECT I: Renovation of career training areas for welding, HVAC, and other building trades at the Educational Cultural Complex (ECC) to improve safety, upgrade equipment, and add innovative technologies and processes that align with projected industry standards and practices.

PROJECT II: Modernize facilities to support the expansion of the in-demand automotive technology program by renovating the existing facility to support modern technologies, equipment, and processes to align with projected industry practices and environments, ensuring students receive education, hands-on experiences, and internships relevant to the demands of the workforce and increasing their employability upon graduation.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE HH (CONTINUED)

PROJECT III: Repair and renovate the Continuing Education Mesa College and Mid-City Campuses to address issues presenting potential property damage to the building's structure, walls, ceilings, floors, and fixtures to preserve the integrity of the buildings.

PROJECT IV: Construction of a new Central Plant and associated utility and energy infrastructure at the ECC to allow for more sustainable practices with energy-efficient technologies and systems to help reduce utility costs and ensure reliable access to essential cooling, heating, and electrical utilities crucial for maintaining a quality learning environment and supporting campus and community activities.

PROJECT V: Renovation of existing the 50-year-old Educational Cultural Complex, including the construction of a new Student Services Center to centralize student support services and programs, a new Community Room to expand ECC's capacity for hosting meetings, workshops, and events for the community, and add new childcare facilities to serve student parents.

PROJECT VI; Expand or construct a new Mid-City Campus to allow for critical facility growth to address chronic waiting lists for in-demand programs such as English as a Second Language (ESL), Citizenship, Emeritus, job training and skill development, and other vital social gateway programs that can mitigate barriers to education, social integration, and economic opportunity for older residents and San Diego's growing immigrant community.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY

THE CITIZENS' BOND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS' ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS' ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE PERMITTED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES
