**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that an election will be held on November 5, 2024, at which there will be submitted to the qualified electors of each district the following measures:

**MEASURE G – COUNTY OF SAN DIEGO**

**FUND SAN DIEGO COUNTY TRANSPORTATION, INFRASTRUCTURE, AND SAFETY PROJECTS THROUGH A HALF-CENT SALES TAX.** To repair/upgrade roads, bridges, storm drains, rail lines, and prevent railway bluff collapse; reduce traffic congestion; improve pedestrian, bicyclist, and driver safety; improve public transit; protect wildlife habitat/air quality; and fill potholes; shall the measure authorizing a half-cent sales tax raising \$350,000,000 annually until ended by voters, requiring citizen oversight, public spending disclosure, and independent annual audits be adopted?

**MEASURE U – ALPINE UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With no increase in the expired 2023-24 tax rates, shall Alpine Union School District's measure to replace leaky roofs, inefficient heating, air-conditioning and electrical at Boulder Oaks Elementary School, Shadow Hills Elementary School, Joan MacQueen Middle School, Mountain View Learning Academy and Creekside Early Learning Center be adopted, authorizing \$6.3 million of bonds with legal rates, levies of \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (generating \$1,200,000 annually while outstanding), audits, independent oversight, State matching funds eligibility, public disclosure of spending, and no funds taken by the State and used in other school districts?

**MEASURE V – BONSALL UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To prepare students for college, careers and trades, and support hands-on math, science, engineering and technology instruction by upgrading classrooms, labs, facilities, and equipment; improving school safety/security systems, fixing deteriorating roofs, plumbing, electrical systems; and adding classrooms/ facilities to prevent overcrowding; shall Bonsall Unified School District's measure authorizing \$59,000,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying approximately 4¢ per \$100 assessed value (approximately \$3,800,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with oversight, audits, all money locally controlled?

**MEASURE W – CAJON VALLEY UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With funds that cannot be taken by the State, shall Cajon Valley Union School District's measure to repair or replace leaky roofs, pipes and plumbing; update inefficient heating and cooling systems; and renovate classrooms be adopted, authorizing \$280 million of bonds with average levies below \$27 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (raising \$15 million annually) while outstanding, legal rates, citizen oversight, state matching funds eligibility, audits, full public disclosure of spending and no estimated increase in current tax rates?

**MEASURE AA – CHULA VISTA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Chula Vista Elementary School District's measure to upgrade emergency communications and security systems; repair deteriorating roofs; ensure accessibility for the disabled; and renovate aging playground equipment and existing classrooms be adopted, authorizing \$360 million of bonds levying approximately \$29 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (raising \$22 million annually) while outstanding, with legal rates, independent oversight, eligibility for State matching funds and full public disclosure of spending?

**MEASURE Y – DEHESA SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To improve the quality of education; construct/ modernize/ renovate classrooms, restrooms and school facilities; replace outdated heating and cooling systems; and replace leaky roofs; shall Dehesa School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$3,300,000 of bonds at legal interest rates, generating on average \$222,000 annually as long as bonds are outstanding at a rate of approximately \$25 per \$100,000 assessed value, with annual audits, independent citizens' oversight, no money for salaries and no money taken by the State?

**MEASURE Z – ENCINITAS UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To improve the quality of education; replace leaky roofs; upgrade infrastructure including plumbing, sewer, and HVAC; improve safety and security; and construct/renovate/modernize classrooms, restrooms and school facilities; shall Encinitas Union School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$158,300,000 of bonds at legal rates, generating on average \$9,200,000 annually while bonds are outstanding at a rate of approximately \$19 per \$100,000 assessed value, with annual audits, independent citizens' oversight, NO money for salaries and all money staying local?

**MEASURE BB – FALLBROOK UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To update local high school facilities, repair, construct/improve classrooms, science labs, instructional technology, career-training/school facilities to support college/career readiness in math, science, engineering, technology, arts, and skilled trades; replace aging roofs, plumbing, electrical systems; improve safety access for all students; shall Fallbrook Union High School District's measure authorizing \$56,000,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying \$24 per \$100,000 assessed value (\$3,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with citizen oversight and all money locally controlled?

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Lemon Grove School District's measure to ensure disabled access and expand science, technology, coding, robotics, engineering, arts, and math classrooms and labs be adopted, authorizing \$30 million of bonds with legal rates, average levies below \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (generating \$1.8 million annually) while outstanding, citizen oversight, audits, no funds for administrator salaries and full public disclosure of spending?

**MEASURE CC – LEMON GROVE SCHOOL DISTRICT**

REPAIRS BOND. With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Lemon Grove School District's measure to replace leaky roofs and plumbing; update aging electrical and inefficient heating and cooling systems; and improve security systems be adopted, authorizing \$30 million of bonds with legal rates, average levies below \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (generating \$1.8 million annually) while outstanding, citizen oversight, audits, no funds for administrator salaries and full public disclosure of spending?

**MEASURE GG – RAMONA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Ramona Unified School District's measure to improve career, college preparation and vocational education facilities; repair leaky roofs and plumbing; update emergency communication/fire alarm systems; and replace deteriorating portable classrooms be adopted, authorizing \$26.7 million of bonds with audits, legal rates, average levies of \$59 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (generating \$4.3 million annually) while outstanding, independent oversight and public disclosure of all spending?

SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, AFFORDABLE EDUCATION, CAREERS MEASURE.

Shall San Diego Community College District’s measure to:

- Repair classrooms
- Protect college affordability
- Prepare students for careers including nursing, firefighting, science, engineering
- Repair deteriorating roofs, electrical/gas lines
- Ensure safe drinking water
- Remove lead paint, asbestos
- Improve veteran/homeless student resources

be adopted authorizing \$3.5 billion in bonds at legal rates, averaging 2.5¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation (generating \$168 million annually while bonds are outstanding) with oversight, spending disclosures, funds staying local?

**MEASURE JJ – SAN MARCOS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To repair and upgrade older schools, remove asbestos, lead pipes, mold; fix deteriorating roofs, plumbing, sewer, and electrical; support college/ career readiness in math, science, engineering, technology, arts, and skilled trades; by modernizing classrooms, science labs, school facilities, and technology, shall San Marcos Unified School District’s measure authorizing \$324 million in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying 4 cents per \$100 assessed value (\$20 million annually) while bonds are outstanding, with citizen oversight and all money locally controlled?

**SAN YSIDRO SCHOOL DISTRICT’S IMPROVEMENT BOND.** With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall San Ysidro School District’s measure to replace leaky roofs and plumbing; upgrade aging electrical, heating and air-conditioning; improve classroom technology at Ocean View Hills Elementary and Vista Del Mar Middle Schools; and construct new educational facilities be adopted, authorizing \$68.5 million of bonds with legal rates, audits, levies below \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while outstanding (raising \$4,450,000 annually), citizen oversight, and full public disclosure of spending?

**SAN YSIDRO SCHOOL DISTRICT’S SAFETY/CONSTRUCTION BOND.** With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall San Ysidro School District’s measure to improve student safety and school security; upgrade emergency communications; construct classrooms at Ocean View Hills Elementary and Vista Del Mar Middle Schools; and construct new educational facilities be adopted, authorizing \$66.5 million of bonds with legal rates, audits, levies below \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while outstanding (raising \$4,350,000 annually), citizen oversight and full public disclosure of spending?

**MEASURE MM – SAN YSIDRO SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall San Ysidro School District’s measure to improve school safety; replace roofs, electrical, plumbing, heating and air-conditioning systems; add new classrooms; and repair aging restrooms at La Mirada, Smythe, Sunset, and Willow Elementary Schools, San Ysidro Middle School, and Preschool & Child Development Center be adopted, authorizing \$12,900,000 of bonds with average levies below \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while outstanding (raising \$830,000 annually), with legal rates, audits, citizen oversight and public disclosure of spending?

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Santee School District’s measure to replace leaky pipes and plumbing; repair inefficient heating and air-conditioning; update emergency communications; and improve school security be adopted, authorizing \$30.62 million of bonds with legal rates, audits, average levies below \$12 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (raising \$1.8 million annually while outstanding), citizen oversight, full public disclosure of all spending and no estimated increase in current tax rates?

**South Bay Union School District’s Safety/STEAM Bond.** To improve local schools with funds that cannot be taken by the State, shall South Bay Union School District’s measure to ensure disabled access; expand Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math classrooms; and upgrade emergency communications and security systems be adopted, authorizing \$67 million of bonds with legal rates, estimated levies below \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while bonds are outstanding (raising \$3.7 million annually), independent citizen oversight and full public disclosure of spending?

**South Bay Union School District’s Classroom Repair Bond.** To repair local schools with funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall South Bay Union School District’s measure to replace leaky pipes and plumbing; repair classrooms; and upgrade aging electrical/ air-conditioning systems be adopted, authorizing \$58 million of bonds with legal rates, estimated levies below \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while bonds are outstanding (raising \$3.8 million annually), annual audits, independent citizen oversight and full public disclosure of spending?

**MEASURE SW – SOUTHERN WESTERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT**

**SOUTHWESTERN COLLEGE CAREER EDUCATION, REPAIR, AFFORDABLE HIGHER EDUCATION MEASURE.** To prepare students/veterans for jobs; upgrade vocational/career classrooms, labs/technology/equipment to train local nurses, firefighters/paramedics/other occupations; remove lead pipes/asbestos; repair deteriorating gas/sewer lines; shall Southwestern Community College District issue \$800,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levy on average \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, generating \$51,000,000 annually while bonds are outstanding, requiring audits, public oversight/spending disclosure, all funds staying local, be adopted?

**MEASURE RR – SWEETWATER UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To repair/upgrade schools, including vocational/career, science, engineering classrooms/labs, technology; improve safety/security, emergency communications systems; remove asbestos/lead paint/mold; provide safe drinking water; repair gas/sewer lines, restrooms; shall Sweetwater Union High School District’s measure authorizing \$647,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying \$30 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, raising approximately \$42,600,000 annually while bonds are outstanding, requiring public spending disclosure, oversight, all funds used locally, be adopted?

**MEASURE SS – VALLEY CENTER-PAUMA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

With funds that cannot be taken by the State and spent elsewhere, shall Valley Center-Pauma Unified School District’s measure to expand career and technical education training facilities; renovate and modernize Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics classrooms and labs; and improve safety and security be adopted, authorizing \$84.6 million of bonds with average levies below \$54 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (raising \$5.4 million annually) while outstanding, legal rates, independent audits, citizen oversight, and full public disclosure of all spending?

**MEASURE TT – WARNER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

To address health and safety, install a drinking well with treatment system to eliminate arsenic/ contaminants, upgrade fire alarm system, update electrical and utility, and ensure the evacuation preparedness; shall the Warner Unified School District measure authorizing \$3,800,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted, levying \$38 per \$100,000 assessed value while bonds are outstanding (collecting \$243,662 annually on average), with citizen oversight, no funds for administrators, and all money improving Warner Unified School District?

Said arguments shall be accompanied by the statement required by California Elections Code Sec. 9600.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that, based upon the time reasonably necessary to prepare and print the arguments and sample ballots and to permit the 10-day examination period for said election, the arguments must be received in the office of the Registrar of Voters, 5600 Overland Ave., San Diego, no later than 5:00 p.m., August 15. (Arguments may be changed or withdrawn until and including this date.)

Official election materials will be available for viewing at the Registrar of Voters Office in accordance with California Elections Code Sec. 9190, 9295, 9380, & 9509.
